Requirement 2	
A. Discuss with your counselor the aspects of emergency preparedness. i. Prevention ii. Protection iii. Mitigation iv. Response v. Recovery	Covered in Personal Emergency Preparedness (PEP) and Merit Badge Midway
B. Demonstrate your understanding of each aspect of emergency preparedness in requirement 2A (prevention, protection, mitigation, response and recovery) for 10 of the situations listed below. You must use the first 5 listed, but you may choose any other 5 listed for a total of 10 situations.

Requirement 4	
Show three ways of attracting and communicating with rescue planes/ aircrafts.	Self-Study: Research online
Requirement 5	
With another person, show a good way to transport an injured person out of a remote and/or rugged area, conserving the energy of rescuers while ensuring the well-being and protection of the injured person.	Self-Study: Review First Aid Merit Badge training materials and demonstrate to your counselor
Requirement 6	
A. Describe the National Incident Management System (NIMS)/ Incident Command System (ICS).	Self-Study: Research online
 B. Identify the local government or community agencies that normally handle and prepare for emergency services similar to those of the NIMS or ICS. Explain to your counselor ONE of the following: How the NIMS/ ICS can assist a Boy Scout troop when responding in a disaster. How a group of Scouts could volunteer to help in the event of these types of emergencies. 	Self-Study: Research online and explain to your counselor

Requirement 7	
A. Take part in an emergency service project, either a real one or a practice drill, with a Scouting unit or a community agency.	Self-Study: Volunteer with your local Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) or your school's emergency planning team

Requirement 8	
A. Identify things a group of Scouts should be prepared to do, the training they need, and the safety precautions they should take for the following emergency services: 1. Crowd and traffic control 2. Messenger service and communication 3. Collection and distribution services 4. Group feeding, shelter, and sanitation	Self-Study: Research online
B. Prepare a personal emergency service pack for a mobilization call. Prepare a family kit (suitcase or waterproof box) for use by your family in case an emergency evacuation is needed. Requirement 9	
A. Using a safety checklist, inspect your home for potential hazards. Then explain the hazards you find and how they can be corrected.	Self-Study: Use SCCFD <u>Home Fire Safety</u> Inspection Checklist and review with family members
B. Review or develop a plan of escape for your family in case of fire in your home.	Covered in Personal Emergency Preparedness (PEP) and Merit Badge Midway
C. Develop an accident prevention program for five family activities outside the home (ex: at a picnic or a movie) that includes possible hazards, a proposed plan to correct those hazards, and the reason for the corrections you propose.	Self-Study: Discuss with family members
